ORDER
("Complainant") has filed this Complaint against United States Circuit Judge (the "Subject Judge"), pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 351(a) and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States ("JCDR").
Background
The record shows that in December 2015 Complainant filed a petition for writ of mandamus with this Court, and in August 2016 a two-judge panel that did not include the Subject Judge dismissed the petition for lack of jurisdiction.
The record shows that in January 2018 Complainant filed in a district court in another circuit a complaint in which he named the Subject Judge as a defendant. In February 2018 a district judge who is not the Subject Judge issued an opinion dismissing the case for lack of subject matter jurisdiction.
Complaint
Complainant's Complaint of Judicial Misconduct or Disability is composed of various documents, including the February 2018 opinion described above.
Discussion

Complainant raises no allegations that the Subject Judge engaged in misconduct, and he provides no credible facts or evidence supporting that the Subject Judge engaged in misconduct.

The Complaint "is based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred or that a disability exists," JCDR 11(c)(1)(D). For that reason, pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii) and Rule 11(c)(1)(D) of the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States, this Complaint is **DISMISSED**.
