| ("Complainant") has filed this Complaint against United States District Judge (the "Subject Judge"), pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 351(a) and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States ("JCDR"). |
| Background |
| In his Complaint of Judicial Misconduct or Disability, Complainant indicates his Complaint concerns the Subject Judge's conduct in a criminal case in which Complainant was not a party. In that case, a federal grand jury issued an indictment in November 2017 charging a defendant with a drug-related offense, and the defendant later pled guilty to the charge. In November 2018 the Subject Judge sentenced the defendant to a term of 160 months of imprisonment. In March 2021 the defendant filed a motion for compassionate release pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3582(c)(1)(A), and the Subject Judge denied the motion in May 2021. The defendant filed a motion for reconsideration, which the Subject Judge denied. |

Complaint

In his Complaint of Judicial Misconduct or Disability, Complainant alleges the Subject Judge abused her authority, ruled on the motion for compassionate release without authority, "does not follow the strict letter of law," was not authorized to adjudicate any matters involving the defendant because the United States had not been harmed, and engaged in conduct that was "treasonous and seditious."

Discussion

Rule 4(b)(1) of the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States, "Allegations Related to the Merits of a Decision or Procedural Ruling," provides in part that "[c]ognizable misconduct does not include an allegation that calls into question the correctness of a judge's ruling, including a failure to recuse." The "Commentary on Rule 4" states in part:

Rule 4(b)(1) tracks the Act, 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii), in excluding from the definition of misconduct allegations "[d]irectly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling." This exclusion preserves the independence of judges in the exercise of judicial authority by ensuring that the complaint procedure is not used to collaterally call into question the substance of a judge's decision or procedural ruling. Any allegation that calls into question the correctness of an official decision or procedural ruling of a judge — without more — is merits-related.

To the extent Complainant's allegations concern the substance of the Subject Judge's official actions, findings, rulings, and orders in the above-described case, the allegations are directly related to the merits of the Subject Judge's decisions or procedural rulings. Apart from the decisions or procedural rulings that Complainant challenges, he provides no credible facts or evidence in support of his claims that the Subject Judge abused her authority or otherwise engaged in misconduct.

The allegations of this Complaint are "directly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling," JCDR 11(c)(1)(B), and the Complaint "is based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred or that a disability exists," JCDR 11(c)(1)(D). For those reasons, pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii) and (iii), and Rule 11(c)(1)(B) and (D) of the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States, this Complaint is **DISMISSED**.
