ORDER
("Complainant") has filed this Complaint against United States District Judge (the "Subject Judge"), pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 351(a) and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States ("JCDR").
Background
The record shows that in October 2020 Complainant filed a civil rights complaint against his former attorney and a motion for leave to proceed <i>in forma pauperis</i> . After that, over a period of months, he filed a motion to appoint counsel, a "Motion for Judg[]ment," and multiple notices inquiring about the status of the case. In July 2021 the Subject Judge issued an order dismissing the complaint with prejudice for failure to state a claim and denying the pending motions as moot.
Complaint
In his Complaint of Judicial Misconduct or Disability, Complainant contends that the Subject Judge ignored or failed to respond to his motions, and he states he feels the Subject Judge is "hindering" his case on behalf of the defendant.
Discussion
Complainant provides no credible facts or evidence in support of his claims that the Subject Judge acted to benefit the defendant or otherwise engaged in misconduct.

The Complaint "is based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an

inference that misconduct has occurred or that a disability exists," JCDR 11(c)(1)(D).

For that reason, pursuant to Chapter 16 of Title 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii) and Rule
11(c)(1)(D) of the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the
Judicial Conference of the United States, this Complaint is DISMISSED.
