ORDER

An individual has filed a Complaint against a United States district judge under the Judicial Conduct and Disability Act of 1980, 28 U.S.C. §§ 351–364, and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

Background

The record shows that in 2022 a magistrate judge issued a warrant authorizing the search of certain premises.

Complaint

Complainant states that the Subject Judge “refus[ed] without good cause to intervene in the issuing of a GENERAL WARRANT which is against the 4th Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America.” Complainant asserts the Subject Judge was aware that it was “common knowledge” that the

magistrate judge who issued the warrant had a “history of unethical issues and partisan past,” and Complainant contends that the Subject Judge should have taken certain actions against the magistrate judge.

Discussion

The Complaint fails to present a basis for a finding of misconduct. Complainant’s claims are based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that the Subject Judge engaged in misconduct. Judicial-Conduct Rule 11(c)(1)(D). For that reason, this Complaint is **DISMISSED**.
