ORDER

An individual has filed a Complaint against a United States district judge under the Judicial Conduct and Disability Act of 1980, 28 U.S.C. §§ 351–364, and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

Background

The record shows that in 2022 Complainant filed a civilrights complaint against one defendant. She also filed a motion for leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*, and a magistrate judge issued a report recommending that the motion be denied for failure to provide evidence of indigency. Over six months later, the Subject Judge entered an order rejecting the recommendation to deny Complainant *in forma pauperis* status, granting her such status, and dismissing her complaint without prejudice as frivolous and for failure to state a claim. Complainant filed a motion for a new trial and to alter the judgment, which the Subject Judge denied.

Complaint

Complainant alleges the Subject Judge violated her civil rights "by failing to provide equal fair due process, protection, treatment." She states, "There is evidence that [the Subject Judge] refuses to act, abide, and comply with the rules, procedures, the rule of law, and acting in a timely manner." She states her case has been "delayed without any legal reason," and she appears to allege the Subject Judge later ordered that the case be closed immediately to allow an entity to take certain actions in violation of her rights.

Discussion

Judicial-Conduct Rule 4(b)(1) provides in part that "[c]ognizable misconduct does not include an allegation that calls into question the correctness of a judge's ruling, including a failure to recuse." The Commentary on Rule 4 explains the rationale for this rule as follows:

Rule 4(b)(1) tracks the Act, 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii), in excluding from the definition of misconduct allegations "[d]irectly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling." This exclusion preserves the independence of judges in the exercise of judicial authority by ensuring that the complaint procedure is not used to collaterally call into question the substance of a judge's decision or procedural ruling. Any allegation that calls into question the correctness of an official decision or procedural ruling of a judge — without more — is merits-related.

Furthermore, Judicial-Conduct Rule 4(b)(2) provides that cognizable misconduct does not include "an allegation about delay in rendering a decision or ruling, unless the allegation concerns an improper motive in delaying a particular decision or habitual delay in a significant number of unrelated cases." The "Commentary on Rule 4" states that "a complaint of delay in a single case is excluded as merits-related. Such an allegation may be said to challenge the correctness of an official action of the judge, *i.e.*, assigning a low priority to deciding the particular case."

The Complaint fails to present a basis for a finding of misconduct. To the extent Complainant's allegations concern the substance of the Subject Judge's official actions, rulings, findings, and orders in the above-described case, the allegations are directly related to the merits of the Subject Judge's decisions or procedural rulings. Judicial-Conduct Rule 11(c)(1)(B). Complainant's remaining claims are based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that the Subject Judge acted with an illicit or improper motive or otherwise engaged in misconduct. Judicial-Conduct Rule 11(c)(1)(D). For these reasons, this Complaint is **DISMISSED**.
