ORDER

An individual has filed a Complaint against a United States district judge under the Judicial Conduct and Disability Act of 1980, 28 U.S.C. §§ 351–364, and the Rules for Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

Background

The record shows that in 2021 Complainant filed a petition for writ of habeas corpus, 28 U.S.C. § 2254, challenging certain state-court convictions. After various proceedings, the case was reassigned to the Subject Judge, and Complainant filed an amended petition. The Subject Judge entered an order denying the amended petition. Complainant filed a motion for reconsideration, which the Subject Judge denied. Complainant then filed multiple motions seeking various types of relief, and the Subject Judge entered an

order denying the motions and enjoining Complainant from future filings without first obtaining leave.

Complaint

Complainant states he was entitled to relief in the above-described case, and he asserts that the Subject Judge "t[ook] the case over," violated his rights, and "did not do his job as a federal judge." He also takes issue with his underlying criminal case, and he attached documents to his Complaint.

Discussion

Judicial-Conduct Rule 4(b)(1) provides in part that "[c]ognizable misconduct does not include an allegation that calls into question the correctness of a judge's ruling, including a failure to recuse." The Commentary on Rule 4 explains the rationale for this rule as follows:

Rule 4(b)(1) tracks the Act, 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(ii), in excluding from the definition of misconduct allegations "[d]irectly related to the merits of a decision or procedural ruling." This exclusion preserves the independence of judges in the exercise of judicial authority by ensuring that the complaint procedure is not used to collaterally call into question the substance of a judge's decision or procedural ruling. Any allegation that calls into question the correctness of an official decision or procedural ruling of a judge — without more — is merits-related.

The Complaint fails to present a basis for a finding of misconduct. To the extent Complainant's allegations concern the substance of the Subject Judge's official actions, rulings, findings, and orders in the above-described case, the allegations are directly related to the merits of the Subject Judge's decisions or procedural rulings. Judicial-Conduct Rule 11(c)(1)(B). Complainant's remaining claims are based on allegations lacking sufficient evidence to raise an inference that the Subject Judge violated his rights or otherwise engaged in misconduct. Judicial-Conduct Rule 11(c)(1)(D). For these reasons, this Complaint is **DISMISSED**.
